Our nonprofit agency partners have taught us the beauty of what our food donations can do: it fills the hearts and minds of people who are facing some of their darkest hours and most challenging times. This is through the comfort of knowing that someone cares about them. Join and support us as we champion for change. Here's what we we've been up to.



Our last four years of impact has orchestrated more than 175,000 rescued meals or approximately \$800,000 in savings for nonprofit agencies.

Through a partnership with Pepperdine University's Graziadio Business School MBA-E2B Program for 2017, Urban Harvester has been selected to be a case project in their 16 week spring semester.





Costco Wholesalers and Urban Harvester just completed a four-year pilot program using a Los Angeles area store as the model. Together we fed many thousands of people, reduced waste and changed lives. The system ran efficiently seven days a week within the construct of their existing operation.

Our initiative with Joint Venture Silicon Valley (JVSV) conducted an in-depth look at poverty and hunger in select counties within the region over 16 months. In December, we presented our findings and recommendations for a regional framework based on our site visits, data research & analysis.





An in-kind donation from Santa Clara University's Frugal Innovation Hub transitioned our software designs from paper to our digital, testing prototype.



JOAN HARVEY

Joan is an Urban Harvester volunteer who helps transport food, delivering agencies breakfast with a smile. Joan told us, "There's no better feeling than to see fresh food handed directly to the folks while I'm still there and how happy it makes them feel." Each day, 650,000 meals are prepared in the Los Angeles Unified School District. At Joan's nearby elementary school, she sees an average of 75 to 100 breakfast items declined daily. As a volunteer to several San Fernando Valley food pantries and soup kitchens, Joan's daily run shares the donations immediately. She and her son (seven-years-old and a volunteer-in-training) help us save the food from commercial food photo shoots.
